

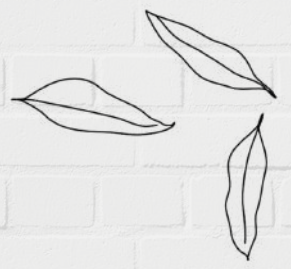

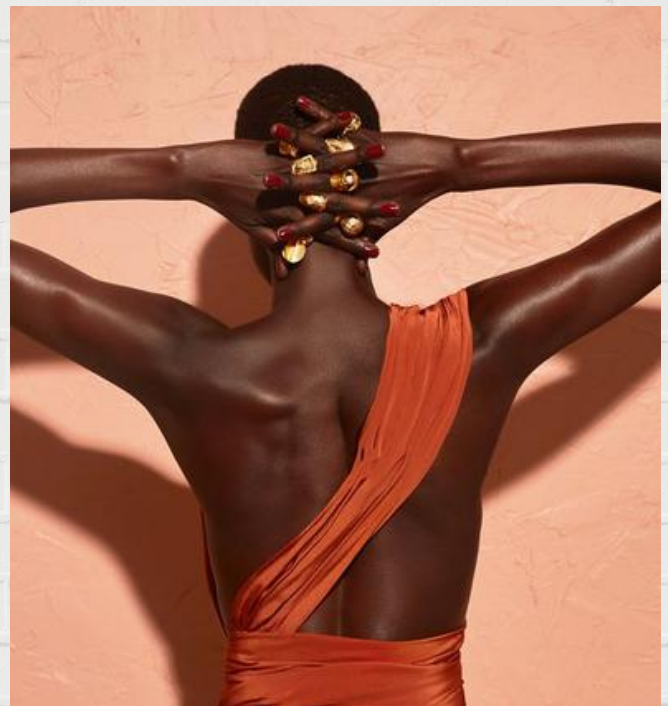
# Allover Leather
